- 32) James T. V. Hill (1854-1928). Lot 160. Section 35. First and prominent local African-American attorney.
- 33) James Sidney Hinton (1834-1892), Lot 1314, Section CG. First African-American elected to Indiana State House of Representatives; African-American Masonic Leader.
- 34) Indianapolis Asylum for Friendless Colored Children. Unmarked graves near NE corner of Section 31, also in Section 37.
- 35) J.J. Johnson (1924-2001), GMI, C-14. Pre-eminent jazz trombonist and composer.
- 36) Sam H. Jones (1928-2003), Lot 209, Section 103. President of the Urban League, 1966-2002.
- 37) **John Ketcham** (1810-1869), Lot 54, Section 7. A white attorney who led a successful defense of John Freeman in a case tried under the Fugitive Slave Act in 1853.
- 38) Etheridge Knight (1931-1991), Lot 173, Section 62. Award winning poet of the 1970s and 80s.
- 39) **George L. Knox** (1841-1927), Lot 201, Section 39. Born into slavery in Tennessee, moved to Indiana during the Civil War, Publisher of The Freeman, considered the city's leading African-American man at the turn of the last century.
- 40) Anderson Lewis (1838-1905), Lot 46, Section 41. Born into slavery, became a successful businessman.
- 41) Dr. Frank Lloyd (1920-2002), Lot 3, Section 88. President and CEO of Methodist Hospital.
- 42) Mercer Mance (1910-1990), Lot 304, Section 78. First African-American judge on State Superior Court.
- 43) Edna Mae Barnes Martin ( 1974), Lot 194, Section 100. Founder of East Side Christian Center, social services organization.
- 44) William McCoy (1853-1893), Lot 322, Section 31. Educator and US Ambassador to Liberia.
- 45) John Puryear (1855-1933), Lot 625, Section 65. One of the first African-Americans elected to the city council.
- 46) Willis Revels (1810-1879), Lot 71, Section 16. Civil War recruiter, pastor Bethel AME.
- 47) Henry J. Richardson (1902-1983), Lot 266, Section 46. Civil Rights attorney elected to State House of Representatives in the 1930s.
- 48) Louis B. Russell, Jr. (1925-1974), Lot 768, Section 212. Teacher and early Heart Transplant recipient.
- 49) Reverend Mozel Sanders (1924-1988), Community Mausoeum, D-13-2A. Local minister and civil rights activist.
- 50) Captain James Sears (1937-2003), Lot 1639 Section 97. First African-American State Police Officer in Indiana.
- 51) **Tom Smith** (1843-1922), Lot 678, Section 47. First African-American Firefighter to die in the line of duty. Memorial Bench is located on the Heroes of Public Safety Section (Section 97).

- 53) Charles I. Taylor (1875-1922), Lot 555, Section 53. Manager of Indianapolis ABCs, co-founder of Negro National League.
- 54) Emma Lou Thornbrough (1913-1994), Lot 79, Section 98. Noted Indiana Historian.
- 55) Stacy Toran (1961-1989), Lot 167A, Section 225. Professional Football player on Los Angeles Riaders.
- 56) U.S.C.T. (United States Colored Troops), National Cemetery (Sections 9 & 10). African-American soldiers who fought in the Union Army in the Civil War.
- 57) Dr. Joseph H. Ward (1870-1956), First African-American doctor to be in charge of a VA hospital.

- 59) William Whitfield (1885-1922), Grave 7056, Section F. First African-American police officer killed in the line of duty.
